ACTIVITIES AND RESULTS

1. Increased safe employment / income generating opportunities for target girls.

1.1. Run literacy classes for out-of-school girls

- 1.1.1.** Recruit and train literacy teachers and provide on-going training and skill refresher for teachers

During this period of time, two teachers were recruited for the literacy class. These two teachers were selected from the provincial office of education, youth and sports, since CWCC is closely collaborated with this government institution. They are capable and professional in teaching for this literacy class. The stipend is paid for these two teachers on monthly basis.

- 1.1.2.** Run literacy classes for female students

The literacy classes of CWCC are based in the CWCC safe shelter in Sisophon. A total of 86 students (high at-risk and victims of VAW) were recruited and participated in the literacy classes during this reporting period. The statistical table of the students is as the following:

- 1.1.3.** Revise literacy curriculum on annual basis

The curriculum of literacy was revised for the use of running two literacy classes in the shelter which was taught by the two selected literacy teacher. This curriculum will be revised annually and we plan to revise it again in February 2008.

1.2. Offer Vocational Skills Training for high-risk girls/women

- 1.2.1.** Conduct one annual market survey

This survey aims at assessing on vocational skills in order to keep the project relevant and it is also to allow the Project to identify ‘product

niches’ or services that are currently not being produced in the province but which could be address through vocational skill training.

We were late to conduct this survey at the commencement of the year 2007. Therefore, CWCC and Ponleur Komar (PK) jointly drafted a Terms of Reference (ToR) for submission to DCA for final approval prior to hiring a consultant for the survey. The consultant was hired in December 2007 and the survey began 17th of December 2007. We expect to complete the survey at the end of January 2008.

There is 5 assigned staff from each partner (CWCC and PK) to be involved in the entire process of this survey. They have been coached by the consultant at the stages of finalizing questionnaire, data collection, data entry, data analysis and report writing.

1.2.2. Recruit and train part time and occasional skills trainers

During this reporting period, a total of 5 skill trainers were hired to provide different skill training courses to our target beneficiaries who were high at-risk and victims of gender-based violence in particular domestic violence, rape and trafficking.

1.2.3. Run skills training courses

As an initial step, the program staff identified districts where students would be chosen from. Svaychek and Ochrov districts were identified as having high number of at risk girls. The target beneficiaries of skill training program are high at-risk girls from the two targeted districts who fall into our selection criteria and victims of VAW who are eligible residents at the safe shelter of CWCC in Sisophon.

On 10 and 11 April 2007, the program staff met with the authorities of Svay Chek and Ochrov districts. The program staff advised them of the nature of the program and sought their assistance. The village chiefs were asked to identify and refer girls between 13 to 18 years of age to undertake the skills training course offered. The chiefs were happy to assist.

On 18 April 2007, the program staff met with the Commune Council of SamRong of the Ochrov district to recruit further students.

On 30 April 2007, the program staff contacted and spoke with the authorities of Khum Threas, at Svay Chek district to introduce the program. The program staff also requested permission to promote the program in the villages for girls that had left school in the last two years. The authorities of the districts were happy to assist in the advancement of the program.

On 4 May 2007, the skills training supervisor, head of administration, and the scholarship coordinator visited different communities in the target districts to inform the villagers about the opportunities and recruiting process of students. The staff also visited those students that had previously undertaken the skills training and those that had borrowed money from the CWCC revolving fund to establish a business.

On 15 June 2007, the official opening of the training courses took place. The 64 students attended the opening ceremony, along with a representative from the Ministry of Social Affairs, Ministry of Women's Affairs in the province, the head of the Commune Council, students' parents, NGOs and CWCC staff. A total of 55 students enrolled from the community (age 13-25 years old) to take craft work sewing, mat weaving, bags sewing, and cooking classes. A total of nine students enrolled from the shelter.

The courses began on 1 June 2007. The duration of each course depends on each specific course. The handicraft skill course runs for 4 months, the sewing skill course runs 6 months, mat weaving and bag sewing courses runs 6 months and cooking course runs for 6 months. From June to December 2007, we received additional 22 trainees. Therefore, a total of 86 skill trainees (64 at-risk girls and 22 victims) were offered with different courses as the above mentioned.

The girls/women themselves decided which course they wished to participate in; the program staff facilitated this decision-making process through discussion with all participants about their medium- and longer term goals.

As part of the training, the trainees were also offered to attend literacy classes and obtained training about life skills. The small business courses were offered once the students finish their course successfully.

Prior to completion of each course, the trainees participated in a study tour which was facilitated by the skill training program to visit different non-governmental organizations in Banteay Meanchey and Battambang provinces that were running vocational training courses. The places they visited including several craft sewing shops in Poipet, Field Relief Agency in Poipet, a traditional mat weaving village at Mongkul Borey district in Banteay Meanchey, Pteas Toek Dong organization and SABOROS organization in Battambang. The purpose of these study tours is gain more knowledge from other vocational training courses which were run by other organizations in order to better improve their capacity prior to starting their own business.

1.3. Provide non-credit support to VST graduates

1.3.1. Organize and conduct provincial level forum events

This provincial level forum will be conducted twice over the project's life. The forum discuss on skills training options and non-formal education initiatives for girls-at-risk in the province. The annual market analysis conducted jointly by CWCC and PK will be highlighted during the forum events. The first forum planned to organize in the second semester in 2007 but it was failed to have it done since we were late to conduct market survey this year. Therefore, CWCC will collaborate with PK to conduct its first provincial level forum in March 2008.

1.3.2. Provide non-financial assistance to successful trainees

All trainees who passed their skills courses successfully were offered additional job and employment counseling to identify options and think through the implications for themselves and for their families.

On the 21st of September 2007, the provincial coordinator, the skill training supervisor and staff prepared a meeting with 23 successful trainees of sewing course at the safe shelter. The meeting aimed at identifying options for those graduates about how to start up their small business by using their acquired skill on individual or collective group basis and where they should start. The staff also took opportunity to promote about credit loan program for those eligible girls and encouraged them to get the loans for generating incomes. The girls took few days to consult with their parents/guardians to make decision about these matters.

On the 28th of December 2007, the provincial coordinator, the skill training supervisor and staff prepared a meeting with a total of 20 successful trainees of model sewing, mat weaving and cooking courses at the safe shelter. The meeting aimed at identifying options for those graduates about how to start up their small business by using their acquired skill on individual or collective group basis and where they should start. The staff also took opportunity to promote about credit loan program for those eligible girls and encouraged them to get the loans for generating incomes. The girls took few days to consult with their parents/guardians to make decision about these matters.

As a result of this job and employment counseling and girl's decision making, a total of 37 successful trainees received credit loans and found job employment at sewing craft shops in Poipet and their respective communities. A total of 6 successful trainees started up their incomes generation at their respective communities without getting credit loans from CWCC.

1.3.3. Offer refresher course information about small business to VST graduates

The opening ceremony of skill training classes was organized on the 15th of June 2007. Prior to successfully completing each course, all skill trainees were offered a small business course.

From 17th to 21st of September 2007, a small business course was organized by skill training program and run by administrative staff of CWCC in Banteay Meanchey. He used to teach a Small Business course in ZOA organization in Poipet. A total of 23 craft work sewing trainees

participated in this course. The topics included marketing identification, 4 marketing factors, creative ideas, service marketing, value added method, business planning, profit and loss report and so on. Through careful observation, we found out that 75% of those participants understanding the topics provided.

From 22nd to 28th of December 2007, a small business course was organized by skill training program and run by administrative staff of CWCC in Banteay. A total of 23 trainees participated in this course. The topics included marketing identification, 4 marketing factors, creative ideas, service marketing, value added method, business planning, profit and loss report and so on. Through careful observation, we found out that 80% of those participants understanding the topics provided.

1.3.4. Facilitate collective enterprise for VST graduates.

Prior to start up of their small business, all successful trainees identified their needs on how to use their acquired skill for income generation. This referred to start up their small business as individual and collective basis. Based on their best interest, all graduates decided to generate income on individual basis. Some were facilitated to work in craft shops in Poipet, some returned back to work at their respective villages, some worked at the center of Banteay Meanchey and so on. None of them decided to establish collective business group.

1.3.5. Pilot NGO restaurant and shop

CWCC will cooperate with its core partner PK to open this pilot shop in the next coming year 2008.

1.3.6. Conduct annual review of curriculum of each skill training course

Each skill training course was reviewed and modified with participation from program staff and skills trainers. The final curricula will be printed in January 2008 for offering further skills courses.

1.3.7. Follow up and monitor trainees for up to one and half years after completion of the course

The program staff conducted follow-up visits to successful trainees after graduation to ensure they are able to transfer their skills to engage in income generating activities, and are able to manage activities and resources.

On the 6th of November 2007, the skill staff went to visit four graduates who are craft work sewers at a craft shop in Kampong Svay commune. The purpose of the visit was to find out the general working situation of those girls in order to ensure that they are remained at work. Our staff found those girls happily working to earn income for supporting themselves and their families. These girls just started their work, thus their income were still low. On the 15th of November 2007, the skill staff went to visit these four graduates again and found out that their incomes were improved. The staff gave advice for them to remain at work and try to work for improving their living condition.

On the 24th of December 2007, the skill supervisor conducted follow-up visits to 5 graduates who are employer in several sewing craft shops in Poipet. The skill supervisors asked the graduates about their general employment situation, income and problems. He also encouraged and gave advice for the girls to remain at work in order to enhance their livelihood. Furthermore, he took this opportunity to talk directly with the craft shop owners to take care of those graduates and give advice to them if necessary.

On the 25th of December 2007, the skill supervisor conducted follow-up visits to 3 graduates who are engaging in sewing craft work by using their acquired skill in Samroang commune. The skill supervisors asked the graduates about their general employment situation, income and problem occurring, and he also encouraged and gave advice to those girls to remain at work in order to enhance their livelihood. After having asked, he found out that these girls are still earn low income from their work since they just started. In addition, he found out that during harvest season, these girls left their work for a while and once they finished their rice field work, they were back to continue their work as normal.

1.3.8. Conduct a total of three Employment Workshop/s

Due to budget unavailability these workshops could not be done in the first year of the project as planned. These workshops will be organized two times over the project life and will be organized in the second and third year of the project.

1.4. Provide Revolving Fund Loan Support

1.4.1. Establish a total of five community-based Revolving Loan Committees

The program will establish 5 community-based Revolving Loan Committees to manage and administer the small revolving loan component of this project in February or March 2008. We planned to establish these

Committees in 2007 but we could not do it since our trainees had just finished courses at the end of December 2007. We are identifying any commune whereas majority of our successful trainees who received loans for a suitable place to establish the Committee.

1.4.2. Disburse funds to successful VST trainees based on appropriate business plans and track repayment

Prior to receiving the small loans, all successful trainees were required to read through and agree on general condition of small loan procedures. The small loan agreement is not acceptable without involvement of their parents/guardians and local authorities at their respective communes. A total of 7,400 USD was provided to 37 successful trainees during the time of this report on average; one graduate received 200 USD to start up their small business on individual basis.

2. Improved attitudes towards women and increased promotion of girls/women's rights, family to national level, through a consistent multi-year focus on three key messages of counter-trafficking, gender-based violence, and girl-child rights (especially education and labour related rights)

2.1. Increasing community-level awareness

2.1.1. Establish Youth Clubs

The program identified Svay Chek and Ochrov District as target districts. A total of 10 clubs were established in the previous project and two new clubs were established in 2007. On 20 May 2007 a new club was established in Svaychek cluster school and 15 June 2007 in Taben secondary school. Five of the clubs are from Ochrov district and 7 clubs in Svaychek district. In each club there are 15 members, 10 females and 5 males. In each club, the leader is female and the vice president is male, and the secretary is female.

On the 27th and 28th of September 2007, the advocacy supervisor and her staff and the project coordinator organized an orientation meeting for the two newly established youth clubs, held at Svaychek high school in Svaychek district. During the orientation meeting, the clubs were informed about CWCC's services, introduced to the LEWGs, and educated about Domestic Violence, Rape, Sex Trafficking, Safe Migration, Children's and Women's Rights, and Gender. A total of 32 participants attended this meeting including 30 members and 2 advisors of the new clubs. Through pre and post assessment and a short role play, we found that 82% of the participants understood the topics of this orientation.

2.1.2. Youth Clubs run 4-6 community level awareness raising events annually

The Youth Club organized seven events during this reporting period. This included International Women’s Day, Khmer New Year Celebration, International Children’s Day, National Literacy Day, Human Rights Day and Water Festival. These events were jointly organized by the clubs' members. Before the event they inform the program and seek assistance. The program provides some finance to cover the costs of the clubs' events. Also, an advisor selected from LEWGs and DCG provides assistance and recommendations to the club members.

The topics covered during these events included, Domestic Violence, Rape, Sex Trafficking, Children and Women's rights, and girls’ access to education. To provide an entertaining way of addressing these issues, the youth club members put on plays. Approximately 16,803 participants attended those events.

2.1.3. Strengthen 10 youth club established late in the preceding project

Each club has one adviser who is responsible for dance drama and role play activities. The 2 club unions were selected among 10 clubs which were established in the proceeding project in 2006.

The role of the union is to give advice to clubs at school and district level in order to organize their own activities, facilitate logistic planning for performance, and refer or report cases of VAW to the LEWGs or CWCC.

The unions joined their performance in all activities with other club members.

2.1.4. Formulate Information, Education, Communication ('IEC') campaign/s annually

The program printed and distributed 1120 t-shirts for International Women's Day, Children's Day, Literacy Day and Human Rights Day. A total of 8,695 brochures were printed and distributed to the youth clubs, villagers, students' parents, LEWGs, other relevant institutions, as well as the provincial officers. The leaflet was drafted and will be printed in January 2008.

2.1.5. Install a total of 2 Information Boards at Commune Level

The program staff have finalized design of Billboards (2 for CWCC and other 3 for PK). The billboards will be displayed at the two target districts and will be utilized to post information about child labor and trafficking issues. The three quotations were obtained and the best quote was approved by the Executive Director of PK. These billboards will be installed in January and February 2008.

2.1.6. Mobilize community groups

CWCC produced brochures and posters to distribute to the villagers and participants during the Youth Clubs performance for the four major International Days (Women’s, Children’s, Literacy’s and Human Right’s), during Khmer New Year celebrations and Traditional Festivals. The Youth Clubs performed the short story addressing issues of domestic violence, human trafficking, children and women's rights, and education. LEWGs and the group work also assisted the youth clubs help in decorating, organizing the seats. During these events, our Community Based Organizations

(LEWGs and Youth Clubs) assisted in all processes including preparation, organization and implementation.

2.1.7. CWCC/PK collaborate to produce television documentary

CWCC will collaborate with PK to produce a television documentary which will be focused on girls/women who have migrated out of Cambodia in search of employment and who instead are exploited in the commercial sex industry. This documentary will be produced in the second semester of the year 2008.

2.1.8. Show Mobile Cinema at village-level.

The film shown to the villages is called Bridge of Life,¹ which depicts the dangers of being tricked into forced labor and prostitution from Cambodia into Thailand. During the breaks in showing the film, the program staff ran question and answer sessions to engage with the audience and to ensure understanding of the issues of the film. The mobile film was shown 10 times in the two targeted districts of CWCC, Ochrov and Svaychek districts.

2.2. Provide support for girls in formal education system

2.2.1. Strengthen 8 Local Education Working Groups (LEWGs)

The LEWGs were formed under the preceding project. Specifically, they monitored scholarship recipient performance, and intervene when appropriate. The LEWGs monitored the girl student's performance and intervened where appropriate. They monitored the recipient's attendance lists, and their results in examinations at the end of the course. The LEWGs will also assist with organizing tutorial classes and life skills for scholarship recipients.

A total of 8 LEWGs (a total of 56 members) were established in the preceding project. Each LEWG consists of 7 members. Their position and role are as follows: school director (chief), member of commune council (advisor), representative of parents committee (deputy chief), two teachers (secretary and member), staff of village development committee (member), and representative of scholarship recipients (member).

The main function of the LEWGs is to:

- Promote the program, disseminate, inform, distribute announcement, and explain the scholarship program to the community.
- Distribute and collect the application form among interested girls and parents, commune and village committees, other government agencies and the organization in the communities.
- Select applicants for shortlisting, conduct interviews among shortlisted candidates.
- Make final selection of the girls, access the scholarship types of each girl who had been accepted into the scholarship categories.
- Organize meeting to instruct parent and children about program regulation and condition of scholarship.
- Organize a confidential place for children requiring permanent living from the school.
- Distribute the scholarship recipients to children.
- Distribute rice to the primary school children.
- Monitor the girls' attendance in school, academic performance and the use of materials and funding given in the scholarship packages.
- Organize monthly meeting with scholarship beneficiaries
- Organize trimester meeting with scholarship students, parents, and teachers in order to monitor the process and discuss the issues occurring in the program activity.
- Organize the additional learning class for the slower learner.
- Organize monthly meeting with other LEWGs in order to share experience and inform all the scholarship program activities, discuss action plan, and prepare schedule monitoring and report writing.
- Submit financial and progressive report to DCGs and CWCC.

- Assist in dissemination, advocacy, distribution and monitoring the materials being used by the dissemination and advocacy materials
- Assist in data collection and document of the information

CWCC had no budget for strengthening LEWG members in 2007, therefore, we will submit a request proposal to DCA for budget approval for this activity and we will strengthen those members of LEWGs in June and December 2008. However, an annual meeting of LEWGs and DCGs was organized in March 2007 to review on achievements in the past year, problem solutions and recommendations for the next coming year.

2.2.2. Organize tutorial classes for 335 girls students

The tutorial classes started since October 2007 with a total of 335 scholarship recipients. Two subjects have been offered by teachers in charge including mathematic and physic. The teachers for these tutorial classes are selected from our targeted schools and some are members of LEWG.

2.2.3. Run Life skills enhancement class

The Life Skill classes will be offered to 135 scholarship recipients at secondary schools which will also cover topics on safe migration, sex trafficking, HIV/AIDS, Gender, domestic violence, and child sexual abuse. A topic will last 6 hours all five topics will be spent 30 hours. A total of 3 hours will be spent in each week on Thursday during school hour. The life skill classes are due to commence in February 2008.

2.3. Active participation in networking

2.3.1. PK and CWCC actively participate in at least seven key networks

CWCC is a member of several networks as below:

- 1) BIG.C
- 2) BVST
- 3) OPTIONS
- 4) PoEYS
- 5) VST
- 6) Child Protection
- 7) Gender Networks

On the 12th of January 2007, the coordinator attended the networking meeting funded by Pon Leu Komar. The meeting was attended by other NGOs, Women's Affair provincial department, Social affair provincial department, representative of companies that organize workers to work overseas.

On the 12th of January 2007, the provincial coordinator attended a Vocational Training Network meeting, held in the provincial office of labor and vocational training, Banteay Meanchey. This meeting was organized by the provincial office of labor and vocational training which included participants from various non-governmental organizations that offer vocational training; staff from provincial office of Women Affairs; provincial office of Social Affairs; provincial office of Education, Youth and Sport; and several laborer exporting companies. The purpose of this meeting was to share achievements, experiences and challenges regarding to the issue of offering vocational training and job employment situation.

On the 24th of January 2007, the provincial coordinator and mobile outreach supervisor participated in Border Issue Group for Children (BIGC) meeting, held in the office of Cambodian Hope Organization, Poipet. The CWCC is an active member of BIGC. The meeting was facilitated by a project assistant of UNICEF Battambang. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the 2007 annual planning of BIGC, new organizational structure of Poipet Transit Center (PTC), report on and discuss recent cases of rape and trafficking at Poipet border, and discussed an appropriate referral for three vulnerable children in Obeijon commune.

On the 26th of January 2007, the Provincial Coordinator, Project Coordinator and Program Supervisor attended the meeting with PK at CWCC office to discuss the evaluation plan for achievements of the three years (2004-2006). The training skill program communicated with the authorities in the local of 2-targeted district in order to inform about the new project of EU- GATE and ask for permission in promoting the recruitment students to join the skill course.

On the 23rd of February 2007, the provincial coordinator, project coordinator and administrative officer welcomed representatives from European Union (EU) and Dan Church Aid-Cambodia (DCA) to visit the CWCC's safe shelter in Banteay Meanchey and visited the target areas of the GATE project in Svaychek and Ochrov districts. During the visit, the representatives of EU and DCA also met with youth club members, sewing and mat weaving business collectively set up by our graduates, graduates working at craft shops and scholarship recipients at their rented house.

On the 30th of March 2007, the Executive Director and staff members in Girls' Access to Education project attended a debriefing meeting on evaluation findings, held in the shelter of CWCC in Banteay Meanchey. This meeting was organized by program officers of DCA and external evaluator. The Executive Director and staff members of Ponleu Komar (PK) were also invited to attend this meeting since this GAE project was

jointly implemented by CWCC and PK. After debriefing from the external evaluator, the Executive Director of CWCC and the Executive Director of PK raised questions concerned to the evaluation findings found by the evaluation team. All staff members of CWCC and PK were split into small groups to discuss on SWOT analysis (strength, weakness, opportunity and threats). Each group representative presented the result of group discussion.

On the 12th June 2007, the program staff joined the World International Day Against Child's Labor, at Palelay pagoda which was organized by Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation and sponsored by ILO and IPEC. The title of the event was 'Outcomes for the future, agriculture without child labor'.

On the 25th of September 2007, the provincial coordinator was invited to participated in a meeting with all members of Provincial Office of Education, Youth and Sports (PoEYS) networks, held at Pedagogy school in Banteay Meanchey. A total of 27 participants attended the meeting from offices of education at provincial and district level and representatives from NGO attended the meeting including CWCC, PK, Donbosco, RCEDO, Krousar Thmey, Enfant Du Mékong, Metakarona, and Cambodian Hope organizations. This meeting was organized by PoEYS and chaired by the chief of PoEYS. The purpose of the meeting was to present the reports from PoEYS and from non-governmental organizations that are members of PoEYS networks and to strengthen cooperation between PoEYS and its networks that are currently working with formal education.

2.3.2. Support joint national level lobby efforts

This will be undertaken in the next coming year 2008.²

2.3.3. The three partners will produce a map of organization working on key issues

The CWCC program staff together with PK planned to produce an NGO directory working on key issues in early October 2007. A total of 54 NGOs working in Banteay Meanchey have been identified for this directory. However, it could not be done as planned because it is still lacking some needed information of those NGOs. Therefore, a draft was made and we planned to finalize and print for distribution in January 2008.

2.4. Increasing awareness, knowledge, and visibility at District and Provincial level

2.4.1. Increase attention to women’s rights into Royal Government of Cambodia

On the 27th of November 2007, the provincial coordinator attended a meeting on Provincial Integrated Planning, held at meeting room of provincial hall. This meeting was organized by the provincial office of rural development. A total of 54 participants attended this meeting including provincial officials, members of commune councils, and representatives of non-governmental organizations in the province. The purpose of the meeting was to present about general issue related to proposed activities of all communes in Banteay Meanchey that were consolidated into District Planning Approach Matrix (DPAM) to all NGOs in the province that are currently working for different activities in the province. The further specific meetings at district level were identified in December 2007 for prior information to all participants.

CWCC was given the opportunity to integrate its action plan into District Integrated Planning 2008 during meetings in several districts in Banteay Meanchey. The administrator was assigned to participate in these meetings on 12th in Sereisophoan district, 18th in Svaychek district, and on 20th in Ochrov district.

2.4.2. Organize Radio Talk Shows

The radio talk shows are organized twice a year. This year a total of 2 courses of Radio talk shows were jointly organized by CWCC and PK at provincial level. The advocacy program of CWCC and PK identified a radio station in Banteay Meanchey which calls “Prum Meanchey radio station” to organize these talk shows. The main topic of this talk show was “new domestic violence law and victim’s protection mechanism”. The promotion of this talk show was broadcasted three times prior to the speakers were invited to come on air. The promotion period was begun in October and ended in December 2007. Two special guest speakers were invited from LICADHO and ADHOC in Banteay Meanchey to come on air to discuss and answer question from listeners. A total of 50 listeners called in to ask questions related to the topic.

2.4.3. Produce Round Table Discussion on television 2x/year national level

In the morning of 26 December 2007, the provincial coordinator and the advocacy program of CWCC organized a National round table discussion through National Television (TVK). The main topic of this organization was “Girls and Rights’ Access to Education”. Three special guest speakers were invited to participate in this discussion including a representative of ministry of education, youth and sports, a representative of ministry of women affairs and the acting director of CWCC. The purpose of

organizing this National round table discussion was to discuss two main issues which related to (girl) child rights and girl's education. This National round table discussion was shown four times through National Television (TVK), Bayon Television and Television No5 (TV5).

In the afternoon of 26 December 2007, the provincial coordinator and the advocacy program of CWCC organized another National round table discussion through National Television (TVK). The main topic of this organization was "Impacts on Unsafe Migration". Three special guest speakers were invited to participate in this discussion including a representative of ministry of interior, a representative of ministry of labor and vocational training and the acting director of CWCC. The purpose of organizing this National round table discussion was to discuss two main issues which related to employment issues and trafficking. This National round table discussion was shown four times through National Television (TVK), Bayon Television and Television No5 (TV5).

The results from these two sessions will be shown at least four times through cable television at provincial level in January and February 2008.

2.4.4. Conduct district level forum twice each year

On the 9th of August 2007, the provincial coordinator, project coordinator and the advocacy supervisor and staff organized a public forum on the topic of "prevention and protection of victims of domestic violence" which was organized by advocacy program of CWCC in Banteay Meanchey, held at Sophy pagoda, Ochrov district. A total of 55 participants participated in this forum included local authorities, commune policemen, staff of district women affairs, staff of health center, villagers, victims of domestic violence, members of LEWG and members of youth club. The purpose of this organization was to sensitize the participants about domestic violence issue and to promote about the new domestic violence law. A speaker from LICADHO was invited to raise his practical experience on the issue of domestic violence and give answers to all questions asked by the participants related to the issue of domestic violence.

On the 9th of August 2007, the provincial coordinator, project coordinator and the advocacy supervisor and staff organized a public forum on the topic of "prevention and protection of victims of domestic violence" which was organized by advocacy program of CWCC in Banteay Meanchey, held at Svaychek pagoda, Svaychek district. A total of 59 participants participated in this forum included local authorities, commune policemen, staff of district women affairs, staff of health center, villagers, victims of domestic violence, members of LEWG and members of youth

club. The purpose of this organization was to sensitize the participants about domestic violence issue and to promote about the new domestic violence law. A speaker from LICADHO was invited to raise his practical experience on the issue of domestic violence and give answers to all questions asked by the participants related to the issue of domestic violence.

2.4.5. Organize and implement provincial-level forum event annually

On the 14th of December 2007, the project coordinators and advocacy supervisors along with staff of CWCC and PK jointly organized a provincial public forum, held in the meeting room of University of Management and Economics, Banteay Meanchey. A total of 52 participants (17 are females) were invited to attend this forum including provincial deputy governor, women affairs, deputy chief of provincial police station, office of education, CWCC's network volunteers, CWCC's CBOs (local education working group and youth club) and local authorities who came from five targeted districts in Banteay Meanchey including Ochrov, Malay, Svaychek, Thmar Pouk and Preah Neth Preah. The results of public fora at district level organized by CWCC and Ponleur Kumar were reviewed during this forum for comments and recommendations. The results of this forum will be documented and printed for distribution of all local authorities at the targeted

2.4.6. Produce two television spots during the course of the project

Two spots will be produced during the course of the project. One will be produced in the first year and another in the third year of project mandate. CWCC & PK plan to produce its first spot in November 2007. Therefore, we could not achieve as planned because of time consuming, thus this spot is due to produce in May to July 2008.

2.4.7. Produce a magazine

The CWCC magazine has been in production since 2004. The topics covered include Women and Education, Women and Trafficking, Rape, Domestic Violence, Women's health, CWCC's activities (workshop, Orientation, round table, International Women's Day, International Children' Day, Literacy Day, Enrolment Campaign, Mobile film's activities.

The activities of the magazine program included:

- Organizing a draft of the contents/topic for magazine No. 12, 13, 14
- Gathering information and research on the topic to be covered
- Drafting the reports, design the pictures and layout

- Printing the documents and provided to the edit committee to correct (spelling and the meaning of the text)
- Providing the draft magazine to the Executive Director for editing and approval
- Organizing the printing of the magazine
- Designing the magazine
- Cooperating with all the programs of CWCC
- Partaking in staff monthly meetings
- Reporting to the Project Coordinator

2.4.8. Produce and distribute calendar annually

These calendars are being distributed to the same list as the bulletins but include more government officials (i.e: commune council members).

A total of 8,600 posters and calendars were printed and have been distributed to our stakeholders, partners and target groups in Banteay Meanchey including government institutions, non-governmental organizations, commune councils, villages chiefs, villagers, scholarship recipients, CWCC’s networks and youth clubs. The key message on these posters and calendars was focused on child trafficking and exploitation issues.

PARTNERS AND OTHER COOPERATION

How you assess the relationship between the formal partners (ie. PK and CWCC)

The CWCC and PK have cooperated together in this reporting period as set out below:

- 1- Participating project management team meetings every three months organized by Dan Church Aid – Cambodia to discuss on project management, progressive activities and recommendations for further project implementation.

On the 12th and 13th of June 2007, the provincial coordinator participated in GATE project management team meeting, held at meeting room of DCA in Phnom Penh. The agendas of the meeting focused on joint activities between core partners, past achievements and progressive activities. This meeting was chaired by the DCA program coordinator, Mr. Carsten Hoj, with participation from the executive director and provincial manager of PK and the provincial coordinator of CWCC.

On the 11th of September 2007, the provincial coordinator and project coordinator participated in GATE project management team meeting, at the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) in Phnom Penh. A total of 12 participants participated in this meeting who are senior management level of CWCC and PK and program officers of DCA. This meeting was chaired by Mr. Carsten Hoj, DCA – Cambodia representative. Four agendas were discussed including report on project achievements from January to August 2008, market survey, EU and DCA visit, and establishment of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on joint activities between CWCC, PK and DCA.

On the 7th of December 2007, the provincial coordinator and finance manager of CWCC participated in GATE Project Management Team meeting, held at meeting room of DCA in Phnom Penh. The meeting was to discuss on current activities, past achievements, financial activities and expenditures of project, and signing agreement on MoU between DCA, CWCC and PK. The meeting was chaired by Pernille Tid Simmons, DCA – Cambodia project coordinator.

- 2- Holding management meetings every month to discuss joint activities. The two organizations have cooperated in setting the topics and purpose of activities and sharing materials. The joint activities like the International Women's and Children's Day, National Literacy Day, District and Provincial Public Forum, Radio Talk Show, Formulation of IEC materials, billboard installation and market survey.

On the 31st of January 2007, the Project coordinator, Program supervisor and Advocacy officer attended a management meeting between CWCC and PK at PK's office Banteay Meanchey. This management meeting prepared activities planning for project EU-GATE and baseline survey for the project. The meeting also concentrated on advocacy and skill training program in order to share information with each other and plan implement procedures for the new project.

On 16th of February 2007, the project coordinator, advocacy supervisor prepared a meeting to discuss arrangement of International Women's Day at CWCC's office Banteay Meanchey. The meeting was to identify guest, participants, date, and subject, draft picture to put on T-shirt and budget for the program and to find middle point between CWCC and PK in this program.

On the 23rd of February 2007, the project coordinator, advocacy supervisor prepared a meeting to discuss arrangement of International Women's Day at PK's office Banteay Meanchey. The meeting was to finalize picture and slogan to put on t-shirt for the commemoration.

On the 11th of June 2007, Project coordinator, financial officer and advocacy supervisor attended a meeting with PK at PK's office Banteay Meanchey. The meeting discussed the principle, set up a committee for quotation, arrangement of role play platform in district level, publishing and other report. It was decided that the committee for quotation will have 2 members from CWCC and 1 from PK to make quotation and purchasing materials. Subject of the role play understands of Domestic Violence protection and to help victims. The goal of the role play is to disseminate information of DV and service provide to victims, also dissemination of DV law and victim protection.

On the 31st of July 2007, the project coordinator and advocacy supervisor prepared a meeting to discuss arrangement of District Forum at PK's office Banteay Meanchey. The meeting was to identify guest, participants, date, subject, and budget for the program. Furthermore, they also talked about billboard installation through discussion on draft picture, slogan and quotation process.

On the 20th of August 2007, the provincial coordinator and project coordinator prepared a meeting with the provincial coordinator and advocacy program staff of Ponleur Kumar to discuss on several issues related to joint activities, held at the CWCC's safe shelter in Banteay Meanchey. The issues of joint activities state discussed included installation of information boards, radio talk shows, NGOs directory mapping forms, organization of national literacy, provincial level public forum and procurement planning. The results of this meeting were as the followings:

- i) Information boards: 3 quotations were obtained and agreed that the approval on the best quote will be the responsibility of PK Executive Director.

- ii) Radio talk shows are being done in November 2007 and the speakers would be invited from LICHADO and ADHOC.
- iii) Mapping forms of NGOs directory is set by CWCC.
- iv) Literacy Day will be organized on the topic of “Literacy is Rights-Based”.
- v) Provincial Public Forum will be jointly organized in November 2007.
- vi) Procurement Planning is being jointly set by finance officers of both partners.

On the 28th of September 2007, the provincial coordinator participated a meeting with provincial coordinator and advocacy supervisors of PK, held in PK’s office Banteay Meanchey. This meeting was to discuss on finalizing the MoU on joint activities between these two core partners. As result, the draft MoU was finalized for submission to DCA for verification and approval.

On the 16th of October 2007, the provincial coordinator, project coordinator and advocacy supervisor prepared a meeting to discuss arrangement of talk show, IEC materials production, billboard installation and ToR of market survey. The meeting was to identify pictures and slogan for IEC materials, to verify on quotations of billboard, and to finalize on ToR of market survey.

On the 17th of October 2007, the provincial coordinator, project coordinator and advocacy supervisor prepared a meeting to discuss on arrangement of talk show and provincial forum. The meeting was to identify guest, participants, date, and budget for the forum and talk show.

3- Joint Training and Coaching

The staff members of CWCC and PK participated in a 5-day training course on baseline data collection which was organized and supported by DCA in Phnom Penh which was held from 30 April 2007 to 4 May 2007.

The Provincial Coordinators and finance manager of CWCC and PK attended financial workshop organized by DCA on EU documents from 30 June to 31 June 2007.

The Provincial Coordinators and staff of CWCC and PK attended coaching sessions facilitated by the Consultant for Market Survey who comes from Cambodian Researchers for Development (CRD) in Phnom Penh.

- On the 17th to 19th of December 2007 : coaching on questionnaire formulation
- On the 20th to 21st of December 2007 : coaching on data collection

And there will be more coaching on data entry, data analysis and report writing in January 2008.

**How you assess the relationship between your organization and state authorities.
How has this relationship being affected by the Action**

Local authorities have played an important role in organizing and participating in some activities such as:

- 1- Promoting the project's purpose
- 2- Organizing and participating in International Women's Day, Children's Day, Literacy Day and Human Rights Day.
- 3- Participating in meeting and workshops
- 4- Selecting project beneficiaries

The local authorities have integrated CWCC's work plan into their reintegration planning at the district level.

Our community based organizations (LEWGs and Youth Clubs) have played active roles in organizing and participating in such activities as:

- 1- Promoting the project purpose
- 2- Organizing and participating in International Women's Day, Children's Day, Literacy Day and Human Rights Day.
- 3- Participate in meetings and workshops
- 4- Selecting project beneficiaries
- 5- Following up students in formal schools and VST graduates
- 6- Conducting awareness raising through short story performance
- 7- Referring victims of VAW to the CWCC

In addition, the name of donor (European Union and Dan Church Aid) were announced during commemoration of International Women's Day, International Children's Day, National Literacy Day, Human Rights Day, and during workshops, forum, radio talk show, TV round table discussions and so forth.

PROBLEMS AND CHALLENGES

During this reporting period, several problems and challenges occurred as set out the followings:

- ❖ The number of skills trainees enrolled in this year did not met the project original plan (100 trainees in this year 2007). A total of 86 at-risk girls and victims of VAW were enrolled in skills courses based in the safe shelter of CWCC in Sisophon. In this year of project implementation, we were late in implementing our project activities in particular skill training program. This reason caused a delay in selecting girls for attending the skills courses and we could not offer two sessions for each course as planned.
- ❖ A total of 22 out of 86 enrolled skills trainees left the program to return back to their respective communities through reintegration process or leaving without notice before they finished the courses. Those skills trainees became clients. The staff tried to advise them to finish their course prior to returning home but they did not stay in the courses because they were homesick and did not receive enough moral support from their families/guardians.
- ❖ Some activities could not have been done in the first year 2007 as planned. These activities are: spot production, exposure visit of youth club leaders, and NGO directory production. This failure was due to the lack of time. Therefore, the unspent budget for these activities will be requested to DCA for kindly approval and forwarding to be spent in the second year of project life, 2008.
